The major theme of Vygotsky's theoretical framework is that social interaction plays a fundamental role in the development of cognition. Vygotsky (1978) states: "Every function in the child's cultural development appears twice: first, on the social level, and later, on the individual level; first, between people (interpsychological) and then inside the child (intrapsychological).

In the framework of his development theory, Vygotsky also introduced a concept of the zone of proximal development (ZPD). Vygotsky claims that a child will not be able to develop unless he undergoes or experiences social learning first. He identified two areas, or levels, where the functions in a child's cultural development, appear in: Social level, or interpsychological. The functions first appear between individuals first.

Classroom Applications of Vygotsky's Theory. Vygotsky's concept of the zone of proximal development is based on the idea that development is defined both by what a child can do independently and by what the child can do when assisted by an adult or more competent peer (Daniels, 1995; Wertsch, 1991). Knowing both levels of Vygotsky's zone is useful for teachers, for these levels indicate where the child is at a given moment as well as where the child is going.

Classroom Applications of Vygotsky's Theory
Vygotsky believed that people can only develop properly through social interaction. One of the key elements of human development is play, and Vygotsky proposed some innovative theories on the subject. Vygotsky believed that development consists of internalizing cultural instruments such as language through interaction with other people.

Vygotsky and the Psychology of Play - You are Mom
Children are active partners in these interactions, constructing knowledge, skills, and attitudes and not just mirroring the world around them. Vygotsky opposed the psychologists who believed that children's development occurs spontaneously and cannot be affected by education.
